



This film investigates the impacts of climate change on resource scarcity, migration, and conflict through the lens of US national security. Through unflinching case-study analysis, distinguished admirals, generals and military veterans lay bare how climate change stressors interact with societal tensions, sparking conflict.

The film unpacks how water and food shortages, drought, extreme weather, and sea-level rise function as 'accelerants of instability' and 'catalysts for conflict' in volatile regions of the world. These Pentagon insiders make the compelling case that if we go on with business as usual, the consequences of climate change will continue to grow in scale and frequency, with grave implications for peace and security in the 21st century.

The film's unnerving assessment is a call to action to rethink how we use and produce energy. As in any military defense and security strategy, time is our most precious resource.
