Trash2TREASURE

Our Spring move-out collection is **ON** from May 1 – May 22.

Look for the blue collection bins in residence hall common areas where you can deposit all of these *clean*, still-usable items:

Clothing	Footwear	Linens and towels
School supplies	Art supplies	Costumes
Room decorations	Room furnishings	
Cleaning supplies	Personal care products	
Housewares	Small appliances	

Textbooks, trade books, CDs, DVDs

Non-perishable, unopened food items

You can also drop off clean, gently-used items listed above in the **Food & Freebie Room** in Main Building. You can put usable school or office supplies in the **RUMPUS Room** in 111A Macmillan Hall. Or bring items to the *Center for Sustainability*, Zabriskie 211.

are produced as a community service by the **Center for Sustainability** and the **Environment**.

What to do if you have items in your office or res hall room that are **NOT** still usable?

E-Waste – Have electronic items that no longer work? Bring broken electronic equipment, along with cords, chargers, mice, ear buds, etc. to the IT office in the basement of Macmillan Hall. When their e-waste collection box is full, IT has these items picked up by **EWaste+**, a recycler that responsibly handles such items, keeping heavy metals out of the environment, and destroying computer hard drives so sensitive data is not compromised.



Batteries – bring rechargeable batteries or button batteries (which also contain heavy metals) to the collection box in the *Sustainability Center* classroom, Zabriskie 212. Single use alkaline batteries can be safely tossed in landfill trash.

Light bulbs – we collect fluorescent lamps as they contain mercury. Old incandescent bulbs or non-working LEDS can be safely put in landfill trash.

Plastic bags – we accept these for recycling.

"Installment" is a double play on words: These sustainability newsletters are placed inside bathroom cubicles (*"in stalls"*) and the informational content changes periodically (in *"installments"*).

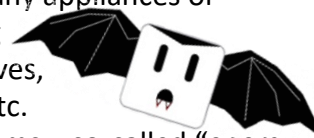
Just a reminder...
