Kevin White, assistant professor of Native American & American Studies at SUNY Oswego, helped to found the Friends of Ganondagan's *Iroquois White Corn Project*, which encompasses history, culture, community, entrepreneurship, collaboration, agriculture, health, and food systems. The goal of the project is to restore the farming, consumption, and distribution of a traditional, nutritious, low-glycemic index Iroquois white corn, used widely by the Haudenosaunee for at least 2,000 years.
